In 2018, we continued to serve millions in the Americas and around the world who are homeless, sick, suffering, and hungry. Our work led us to the world's poorest and most vulnerable people, reaching them with life-saving assistance to alleviate their suffering. Through our relief and development work, we help people to live healthier lives with dignity.



E mergency relief remained a key area of our work in 2018: We responded to the Venezuelan refugee crisis in Colombia, two tsunamis in Indonesia, the Ebola outbreak in DR Congo, and violent conflicts in the Middle East, South Sudan, and Nigeria. We also provided transitional aid in fragile nvironments like Iraq, helping vulnerable communities recover and rebuild their lives after years on the run. We are committed to bringing lasting improvements to people's lives through our development aid programs. Our ongoing efforts to strengthen national health systems in Colombia, DR Congo, Uganda, and Myanmar are part of this commitment.

2018 was a landmark year for Malteser International. Our Emergency Medical Team (EMT) was certified by the World Health Organization (WHO), allowing us to become part of the WHO's global registry for coordinated operations during emergencies like natural disasters and epidemic outbreaks. This certification means we are now able to provide medical aid to people affected in emergencies even more quickly and efficiently.

Another milestone in 2018 was gaining special consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). In the face of ever-increasing humanitarian crises and a greater number of people in dire need, the special consultative status with ECOSOC brings us to the forefront of discussions around humanitarian aid issues.



#### **Complex humanitarian situation**

Armed conflicts accounted for several humanitarian crises in Africa in 2018. Millions suffered from the consequences of unrelenting violence in countries like South Sudan, Nigeria, and DR Congo: displacement, hunger, and the spread of epidemics like Ebola or cholera. Structural issues such as youth unemployment and unsustainable agriculture continued to stem the growth of many countries.

#### Natural disasters and protracted crises

Natural disasters continued to plague Asia in 2018; typhoons lashed the Philippines, floods ravaged communities in India and Myanmar, and two devastating tsunamis in Indonesia left a trail of destruction behind them. Protracted crises such as the Rohingya emergency in Myanmar and Bangladesh presented further challenges for humanitarian aid workers.
