Celina Cotes is a Colombian doctor by profession. She fled Venezuela two years ago after living there for nearly 20 years. Her journey back to Colombia was not easy. After losing nearly everything due to Venezuela's socioeconomic collapse, she settled in the village of Sumain Wayuu in La Guajira (northern Colombia). Here, embraced by the village community, she has turned her suffering into a greater call to action, using her professional skills to mitigate the Covid-19 crisis as a hygiene promoter.

Through this work - the result of an MI Americas project in partnership with the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) - Celina is providing life-saving information and dispelling myths about the virus in her community. She is one of 5 million people who have fled Venezuela, and one of nearly 2 million who have chosen to settle in Colombia. She is also part of a majority of migrants, refugees, and returnees who are changing their communities for the better.

Together, we adapted.

Covid-19 in the Americas

In Colombia & Venezuela, we reached 27,978 individuals in vulnerable communities.

With a worsening humanitarian crisis in Venezuela, the impact of the pandemic amplified the country's existing woes, and creating additional pressures on its neighboring countries, particularly Colombia.



7,000 L of hand sanitizer produced & distributed in partnership with the University of Magdalena, Colombia



10,320 persons reached with in-person information campaigns on Covid-19



7,670 people received hygiene kits to prevent the spread of Covid-19



2,141 community and hand-washing stations renovated or installed



9,988 individuals reached with food and nutritional assistance in Colombia



10 radiospots disseminating information campaigns on Radio Guajira Viva



In the Americas, we localized.

In our over 65 years of experience as a humanitarian organization, we've learned that successful programs start from the ground up, and 2020 was no different.

Community leaders and local partners in all of our projects from Colombia, Haiti, Venezuela, Peru, and Mexico were instrumental in our Covid-19 response projects, particularly in developing information campaigns in indigenous languages.



Covid-19 in the Americas



In the United States, we stood in solidarity with our home city & the Eastern Seaboard



340 flu vaccines given to homeless and underprivileged New Yorkers

The pandemic affected every part of our society

While our Covid-19-related interventions were primarily focused on distribution of PPE, ensuring continued access to hand-washing stations and health clinics, and that the uninsured were able to access medical and mental health care, the overwhelming impact of the pandemic was not lost on us. The consequences of daunting lockdowns caused losses of income, school interruptions, isolation, and upticks in domestic violence across the world, and all of our programs in the Americas adapted accordingly. We opened mobile clinics, delivered food to the most vulnerable including children and the elderly, and used our social media channels to communicate directly with our beneficiaries.

With your help, we were not only able to respond to the immediate needs of our communities, we were also able to expand our services in our maternal care program, as well as in refugee and migrant centers.

Despite a global halt, our boots remained on the ground.

Safe childbirth for migrants and regufees

Thanks to our trained medical professionals in Santa Marta and Riohacha at our mobile medical brigades, Zuleydis (left), gave birth to Thyannis, a healthy baby boy in September of last year.



Food Security in Haiti

Despite increasing security concerns, our program in Haiti continued to benefit Haitians in need. In 2020, in addition to building more community and household gardens, known as "jaden lakou", our beneficiaries were also able to reap their first harvest, working towards building more resilient food systems.

Medical Assistance and Social Cohesion in Colombia & Venezuela

In many places throughout the Americas, MI Americas is the first line of defense, acting as a source of information and safety.

36,485 medical consultations in mobile clinics and local brigades in Colombia

21, 896 consulations in primary health care from mobile clinics and hospitals in Venezuela

299 participated in trainings and workshops on civic engagement and social cohesion

In Peru: care and nutrition for children & the elderly



In Lima, our soup kitchen for children and their families went mobile, delivering meals to 70 families.



Our senior center in Querecotillo delivered non-perishable food & hygiene kits to 35 residents.

Mexico: Protecting infants from HIV



1,712 families received nutritious meals & medication for pregnant mothers to prevent mother-to-child transmission of HIV.

Emergency Responses in The Bahamas, Guatemala & Colombia

As a humanitarian organization, part of our mandate is responding to crises in real time. In the Americas, a region often subject to extreme weather patterns, we were active in Guatemala, The Bahamas, & northern Colombia.



In The Bahamas, we rebuilt two schools in the community of Abaco that were leveled by Hurricane Dorian.



1,073 victims of Hurricanes Eta & lota benefitted in Guatemala, receiving shelter items such as mattresses and hammocks, as well as food packages.


